Report of City Clerk on Ward 3 Polling Location Change

In accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 115 of the Acts of 2020, the City Clerk of the City of Woburn respectfully requests that the location of the polling place for Ward 3, Precinct 1 and Ward 3, Precinct 2 be relocated from the Farmstand Building at 41 Wyman Street to the Hurd Wyman Elementary School at 39 Wyman Street.

On July 31, 2020, Woburn City Clerk William C. Campbell and City Engineer John E. Corey, Jr., PE surveyed the proposed site for the Ward 3 polling location using the regulations of the Secretary of the Commonwealth for polling place accessibility 950 CMR 51:00 and determined the Hurd Wyman Elementary School at 39 Wyman Street meets the criteria for a polling place. A copy of the onsite survey is attached.

Findings:

The Hurd Wyman Elementary School is a newly constructed building which opened for use in 2018. The Hurd Wyman Elementary School is approximately 100 feet away from the Farmstand Building and located on the same campus. The 2019 Municipal Election was held in the Farmstand Building. The two buildings are essentially constructed on the same parcel of land and share driveways, parking, lighting and sidewalks. The Hurd Wyman Elementary School meets the requirements for site access, voting equipment, parking, entrance, ramps and building interior and is suitably large to allow social distancing during voting. The only reason the location should change is the Farmstand Building would not be large enough to accommodate current social distancing requirements. The Hurd Wyman Elementary School is a public school in the City of Woburn, complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and will not have a disparate adverse impact on access to the polls on the basis of race, national origin, disability, income or age, particularly given the buildings close proximity on the same campus.

Based on this information provided for you, I request that the City Council find that the proposed change in polling locations is in accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 115 of the Acts of 2020 and will have no adverse impact on the voters in Ward 3.

1. Site access (Path of Travel):

Yes (a) The paths of travel to the polling place from the parking lot and from the street are clear, reasonably lit, and unobstructed.

2. Parking:

(b) for parking lots striped prior to 9/1/96:

N/A (1) The handicapped parking spaces are 8 feet wide and have an adjacent 4 foot access aisle which is painted or striped yellow. The parking lot is reasonably lit.

N/A (2) The handicapped parking spaces are identified by a sign at each space or pair of spaces containing the International Symbol of Accessibility, with the top of the sign between 5 and 8 feet high above the ground.

(c) for parking lots striped after 9/1/96:

Yes (1) The handicapped parking spaces are 8 feet wide and have an adjacent 5 foot access aisle which is marked by high contrast painted lines or other high contrast delineation. The parking lot is reasonably lit.

Yes (2) Is there at least one "van accessible" space. (one in every eight accessible spaces must be van accessible, but no less than one) This space is 8 feet wide and has an adjacent 8-foot wide access aisle which is marked by high contrast painted lines or other high contrast delineation. The parking lot is reasonable lit.

Yes (3) Each handicapped parking space is identified by a sign containing the International Symbol of Accessibility, with the top of the sign between 5 and 8 feet high above the ground. Van accessible spaces shall include the words "Van Accessible."

Yes (d) Any sidewalk provided at the handicapped parking spaces has a curb cut (sidewalk ramp), with a slope no greater than 1:12, at each space or pair of spaces.

N/A (e) If no parking lot is available, there is at least one on-street parking space which is at least temporarily designated as a handicapped parking space during the election in front of the polling place.

3. Entrance

Yes (a) At least one entrance to the building is accessible.

Yes (b) The approach to the accessible entrance is a paved walk or ramp with a non-slip surface uninterrupted by steps or changes in level greater than 1/2 inch. There is a level space 60 inches from the door on both the exterior and interior sides.

Yes (c) Lever handles or other accessible hardware are provided on doors, so that they may be operated with a closed fist.

Yes (d) Doorways are at least 32 inches clear width. Door thresholds are no higher than 1/2 inch above the floor.

Yes (e) If the main entrance is not accessible, signs direct people to the accessible entrance.

Yes (f) If the accessible entrance is not the main entrance, it is unlocked and able to be used without assistance during the same hours as the main entrance.

4. Ramps

N/A (a) If the entrance has stairs, there is either a permanent or portable ramp. If permanent, the ramp has a slope no steeper than 1:12.

N/A (b) The ramp is at least 48 inches wide.

N/A (c) The ramp has two pairs of handrails along both sides that are round or oval in shape and are set in pairs, one at a height between 34 and 38 inches and a lower one at a height between 18 and 20 inches.

N/A (d) If the ramp is portable, it is as close to 1:12 as possible, and either handrails or wheel guards at least two inches high on both sides are provided.




5. Building Interior

Yes (a) All interior doors, approaches, and ramps necessary to obtain access to the polling place comply with 3 and 4 above.

Yes (b) An accessible route which provides a continuous unobstructed path at least 36 inches wide is maintained inside the polling place and shall coincide with the route for the general public.

6. Voting Equipment

Yes (a) All Polls - A sample ballot will be posted on the wall no higher than 48 inches above the floor.

Yes (b) Paper or Datavote ballots - At least one marking shelf (one for each party in a primary for Datavote) provides a clear space under it at least 30 inches wide, at least 27 inches clear to the underside, and no more than 32 inches high to the top. Any Datavote stylus handle is at least 1 ¼ inches thick and at least 3 inches long.

N/A (c) Voting machines - At least one machine has a sample ballot posted inside, not higher than 48 inches.

N/A Voting levers are no higher than 48 inches above the floor, or a "reacher" is available for the upper levels.
